### A novel experience

During the last two years, many members have used their time at home to fulfil long-held ambitions, including **Avril Duncan**, who tells us here how she came to write her book *Diverted Traffic* 

I was born and grew up in Perth, Scotland, and after a short period away, have been back home for 30 years. Since then I've worked in management for charities including WRVS, NHS/Macmillan Cancer Support and Crossroads Caring for Carers.

I'm now retired and my leisure time is spent as a member of Trefoil, and of Soroptimist International. I'm also a trustee of The Free to Live Trust and the Annie Unwin Trust. I regularly visit India, write poems and books and look after my granddaughters.

After having been a
Brownie Leader for
around 35 years, I retired
and helped to re-start Perth
Trefoil Guild, which was in abeyance.
I stay connected to Girlguiding by being
a county Vice President. Our guild is lively
and great fun, meeting monthly
throughout the whole year, doing
activities our members love – challenges,
fun outings, fundraising, crafts, quizzes,
campfires, doing activities with Guides
and much more. I think Llove the

challenges best, having recently completed the STARS challenge.

I developed a love of writing at school, winning a poetry competition in 3rd Year at secondary school. I've had a few things published in local magazines and one of

my poems published online. Most of my poetry has a comedy

element, or a very serious side – nothing in the middle! I attended a creative writing course at Perth College and joined a writers' group. Both gave me great encouragement when writing my book. I had a lifelong

ambition to write a novel.

I started this one about seven

years ago but abandoned it. When I turned 70, it became item number one on my bucket list, so I re-wrote it and was lucky enough to find a publisher. The subject was easy to choose – when staying at Sangam World Centre in India in 2014, we saw first hand the horrors of human trafficking of children in India. Diverted Traffic is about a child who is

trafficked from her village in India to work in the sex industry in Amsterdam. My heroine, Ellie, attempts to rescue the child and so begins a race against time to get her to safety.

So far the book has been selling well. Friends and family, and lots of strangers too, have given me some lovely feedback. I've been asked to do lots of talks and presentations about it. This gives me the chance to sell copies of the book and donate the money to my charity, The Free to Live Trust (freetolivetrust.org). Our charity built two children's homes in India, and continues to support the ongoing running costs. These look after children who have been rescued from the horrors of trafficking, after being brought out of the red light area of Pune. One nice change in my life is being introduced to people as a published

author – this never fails to delight me. I waited such a long time to become one!

I've got tentative plans to get a book of my poems published and I'm also about halfway through my second novel at the moment. My publisher would like to get it on the market by the summer of this year, so I'd better get my skates on! If my second book is as successful as my first one, then I might even get around to writing a third, although the third one would be a completely different type of book — I quite fancy trying my hand at a romance!

### **Achieving the impossible**

Meet adventurer, author and President of Girlguiding Cymru, **Tori James**, who will be our inspirational speaker at the Annual Meeting in Llandudno

Tori describes herself as a professional adventurer, author and keynote speaker.

She is the first Welsh woman to climb

Mount Everest and she was a member of the first all-female team to ski to the Magnetic North Pole in a 360-mile polar challenge. Tori also holds the record for the longest open sea kayak in UK waters, which she set with the Beeline Britain team. And that's to name just some of her many adventures and voyages!

Over the last 20 years, working in collaboration with high profile sponsors, Tori has undertaken some of the world's

most extreme endurance challenges, setting many records and achieving what most people would consider impossible.

From surviving the death zone on Mount Everest to racing across frozen sea ice in

the Arctic, she is not one for a quiet life.

Currently, however,
Tori lives in Wales
and combines her
outdoor adventuring,
speaking career and
training work with
being a mum. Not to
mention the fact that
Tori is also President of
Girlguiding Cymru, so has lots

of experience with an organisation many of us know well and support through being Trefoil members.

### How we're celebrating The Queen's Jubilee

From badges to beacons to trees, everyone can contribute to this special occasion

This year marks The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, 70 years since she took the throne and became Girlguiding's patron. Her Majesty's involvement with Girlguiding dates back to 1937, when at the age of 11 she became a Guide, and the 1st Buckingham Palace Guide Company was created for her and her younger sister Princess Margaret.

To celebrate The Queen's remarkable 70-year reign, and her 85-year-strong relationship with Girlguiding, we will be joining in with the celebrations across the country and with other organisations.

#### We've partnered with the Scouts

To mark The Queen's Platinum Jubilee year, we've partnered with the Scouts to create a special commemorative woven badge.

This isn't the first badge we have created in collaboration with them, as we also came together to celebrate The Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 and Diamond Jubilee in 2012.

This year, we've created the perfect badge for this special time, to show how grateful we are for The Queen's encouragement over the years. It's also a statement about the solidarity between our two great movements, and our spirit of togetherness.

The collaborative badge is woven and features the official Queen's Platinum Jubilee emblem alongside the Girlguiding trefoil and the Scouts fleur de lis.

"There's lots of symbolism within the badge", explains David, Girlguiding's design lead. "We've got dots radiating around from the central logo to represent the Scouts' and Girlguiding's close relationship with The Queen. And there are 70 dots to represent the 70 years, plus the badge has seven sides to represent seven decades of The Queen's rule.

"I had the idea of weaving the two colours of the Scouts and Girlguiding together to represent our close working relationship. The two colours pop off each other to give a shimmering effect too. I also made the conscious decision to have the official Jubilee logo in the centre because it's central to the whole celebration."

### Beautiful keepsakes for our members

David also created our second Platinum Jubilee badge, a metal pin just for members of Girlguiding. "It's a



circular badge to represent the ongoing relationship we have with The Queen," he says. "The seven jewels around the outside represent the seven decades of her reign. Each of the jewels has four sides, symbolic of Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Rangers. Then we have purple for royalty, plus the colours of our four sections. You get a lot of storytelling in a tiny little space!" We have also created a fun badge to help girls celebrate the Jubilee activities and events they take part in.

2022 will bring lots of opportunities to celebrate and mark this historic moment. These badges are lovely keepsakes, to remind you of a special occasion spent with the rest of your guiding family. All three badges are available to buy on our online shop now.

#### Activities for all to get involved

We've created activities for each section to help girls celebrate in their units or at home. These include edible fires for Rainbows, an interactive Crown challenge for Brownies, campfire making skills for Guides and building obstacle courses for Rangers amongst many others. #### **Beacon lighting ceremony**

Girlguiding was also asked to take part in a special beacon lighting ceremony as part of The Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Over 70 beacons were lit by Girlguiding members across the UK and beyond to mark each year The Queen has been on the throne.

#### The Queen's Green Canopy

We'll also be taking part in the Queen's Green Canopy initiative. We know the environment is something our young members, and volunteers, care deeply about. We'll be planting a new group of trees at each one of our outdoor activity centres. Tree planting will resume in October 2022, through to the end of the Jubilee year, find out more about how to get involved!

Following the sudden death of her husband, Cathy offered help to her local community and this led her to join a home group at the local church. Cathy has also spent many years volunteering at St Austell Community Kitchen (STAK), which supports the vulnerable, needy and homeless in St Austell, where she is part of a team who provide them with hot food and a chat. Cathy



also supports the work of St Petrocs, which has developed halfway houses. Helping is something Cathy enjoys and has always done. "I trained and worked as a nurse, so I suppose it's just something in me, although I prefer to be behind the scenes. I believe you show people God's love by being kind, leading by example." Cathy understands community because she is interested in people – she helped to get the local carnival back up and running and she also ran Brownies for many years. On receiving the Cross of St Piran Cathy said, "I feel so honoured. It's a real privilege and I'm very grateful."

To gain her Gold Vovage Award, Carol Pimlott of Cheadle North Trefoil Guild applied for grants, joined the general committee of a local theatre group, gained computer skills,



### **Programme** suggestions

Here are some more ideas to give fresh impetus to your guild's programme, says Sheila Leete, National Programme and Development Adviser

Are you looking for fresh programme ideas for your guild? Don't forget the activities list on our Trefoil Guild website. which is currently being updated by our country and region Programme and Development Advisers.

In the March edition of *The Trefoil* magazine were a few ideas for Wellbeing, lifting our spirits as spring takes us into summer. In this edition we are sharing ideas under the heading Community.

Many of us will already be aware of what is happening locally, particularly if we are, or have been, involved in running Girlguiding units. We might have arranged a visit to the local hospital radio station or care home. We may have links with local charities, residential homes, or community support centres, making or donating items, or supporting them in other ways.

If we look wider, there are many opportunities for guild visits or speakers. We may have visited the local police station or fire station, but how many of us have attended a local council meeting or how much do we

understand about court procedures? Why not invite your local councillor to come along to your meeting and find out more of their role and how they meet the needs of local people?

Local recycling centres are usually happy to arrange a visit, or provide a speaker, to show where waste goes after it's collected, how it is reused and what happens to food waste. Check on your local council website for contact phone numbers.

How much do we understand of different religions? Is there a local synagogue, meeting house or mosque nearby, where the local leaders would be happy to





explain their beliefs? Visiting a local place of interest is always popular. This could be linked with a talk from a member of a local history group.

Art, music or drama therapists are often happy to visit to explain their role in the community. Local schools or colleges should be a good link for contacts here.

We hear about national charities running events, such as the RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch each January.

The Woodland Trust is 50 years old this year: look out for a local event near vou. Did you know that WaterAid will provide free online speakers? With so many of us used to meeting online, this could be an ideal speaker during winter months. Check the WaterAid website for information

on Global Handwashing Day in


October and World Toilet Day in November. These charities are just a couple of ideas of many.

# Raising funds for the Air Ambulance Service

North East England Trefoil launched the challenge with **500 badges** – now they've raised more than **£12,000** for this deserving cause

Almost exactly two years ago North East England Trefoil had a region weekend at Waddow. We had a lot of fun and talked about many things, and one of our ideas was to organise a fundraising challenge in aid of the Air Ambulance Service in our region. In North East England there are three air ambulances: the Great North Air Ambulance Service, the Lincs and Notts Air Ambulance and the Yorkshire Air Ambulance.

Many people do not realise that air ambulances are reliant on charitable donations and fundraising. The amount of money needed is mind-blowing: it costs £12,000 per day just to keep the Yorkshire Air Ambulance's two helicopters maintained and in the air.


We started designing the challenge by splitting into groups and asking each to think of appropriate challenges within specific themes: Flight, Navigation and Communication, First Aid and Fundraising. The ideas produced were tremendous! In due course they were sorted into three headings: Flight and Science, Navigation and Communication, and First Aid and Safety, and when we left Waddow we were ready to start the work of writing

and decorating the challenge with a view to launching it the autumn of 2020.

Then, almost straight away, we had lockdown. But the work on the challenge continued! Endless emails back and forth kept the process going, and gradually the Air Ambulance Challenge badge came together. We were keen to make the badge accessible to Girlguiding members as well as members of Trefoil Guild, so leaders from all sections were approached to look at our challenges and tell us where they coincided with the programme – a factor that has been particularly good at getting all ages involved.

In autumn 2020 we felt we could wait no longer and so launched the challenge, having tentatively ordered 500 badges. We were delighted with the response! Very soon it was obvious that we would need more badges, and then more again. To date we have sold nearly 1,400.

Fundraising for the air ambulance was an important last part of the challenge, and we provided an opportunity to raise money by organising a Virtual Balloon Race. We never expected it to be as successful as it was, raising £3.500 in the end, and giving us a bit



of excitement just when we were all stuck indoors. In addition, it was completely environmentally friendly, as the whole event was computer generated.

Our race was at Easter, so we had rabbit balloons, lamb balloons, bowls of flowers balloons, and lots of ducks, as well as balloons in all the colours of the rainbow. The race lasted a week and we could see where our balloons were at any time just by putting in the names we had given them. We could even see all the balloons 'flying'! The delighted winner was Mary Pleavin from Chester Grosvenor Trefoil Guild and her balloon was called Precious. She said she entered the race because a friend owed his life to a helicopter ride from Cumbria to Newcastle. Apart from taking

part in the balloon race, groups have been very inventive with their fundraising. Some counties have invited speakers from the Air Ambulance Service to speak at their meetings and have held collections; others have held activity days where all the activities have been from the challenge badge. Northumberland County Trefoil Guild has produced a calendar for several years, the proceeds from which have gone to a variety of charities; this year all proceeds have been donated to the Air Ambulance appeal.

From the comments we have received, the challenge has been much enjoyed by all. The fact that it has raised more than £12,000 for a worthy cause has been a bonus.

### **Eastern promise**

**Sheran Oke** looks back at happier times when links were formed between Eastern European guiding organisations and ones in the west

Do you remember the re-emergence of guiding in Eastern Europe following the breakdown of the USSR in 1991? It was an exciting time with support for WAGGGS to expand, developing Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting in new countries.

In some countries there was the opportunity for already established but 'underground' organisations to be recognised. Junák, the Czech Association of Scouts and Guides, was the first to be readmitted to WAGGGS in 1990. I can remember the amazing welcome I received when I visited Budapest to plan a Europe Region Guide and Scout event. The joy and pride of leaders, who hadn't met with Guiding or Scouting leaders from abroad for many years, and who



wanted to share openly their pride in being part of a worldwide movement with younger people in their communities, was humbling.

Today, the breakdown of peace across Europe reminds us of the strength and importance of our Girlguiding solidarity. Recognising that community support is enshrined within our Promise – many members of WAGGGS organisations in Eastern European countries bordering Ukraine are offering humanitarian aid. Związek Harcerstwa Polskiego (ZHP), the Polish Scouting and Guiding Association, is aiming to connect Girl Guides who have fled Ukraine with Guide/Scout families in Poland who will host them in their homes. Volunteers from ZHP, Junák and Latvijas Skautu un Gaidu Centrālā Organizācija (LSGCO), the Latvian Scouts and Guides Association, are supporting refugees at border crossings, distributing essential supplies like food, water, clothes, blankets and menstrual supplies.

#### **JOURNEY TO MEMBERSHIP...**

In 1991, WAGGGS, recognising a need and opportunity, began to support the development of guiding in former Eastern Bloc countries. Each prospective country member was partnered with a European member organisation and was supported



by WAGGGS Europe Region to achieve membership. The first three links to be formed were Norway with Ukraine, Cyprus with Belarus and the UK with Russia. At the beginning, these six countries worked together for joint trainings in Russia and the UK, as they had many of the same needs, so their leaders knew each other well.

- The Association of Belarusian Guides (ABG) became a full member of WAGGGS in 2002
- The Association of Ukrainian Guides (AUG) became a full member of WAGGGS in 2011. In 2001, the Association's first president, Anna Gulevska, was elected to the Europe Committee WAGGGS
- The Russian Association of Girl Scouts (RADS) became a full member of WAGGGS in 2008. Several close ongoing links developed as UK countries and regions were twinned with regions of Russia. There have been many positive connections, with one of our TOPAZ projects taking place in three different regions of Russia.

Liz Smith, currently Girlguiding assistant county commissioner for Greater London West (GLW), first became involved in the development of guiding in Ukraine in



1994. As the leader of a group of Guides from London and South East England region, she attended SOLOR 94, a large camp at Lillehammer in Norway. Whilst there she met Anna Gulevska, who was starting guiding in Ukraine supported by the Norwegian Guides.

In 1997, Anna worked at Pax Lodge and her dream was for some of our young women to travel to Ukraine to work with their young women. After a feasibility study in Odessa in 1999, 22 young women and five leaders travelled to Ukraine to work with guides in Odessa in 2000. They were joined by guides and leaders from across Ukraine for workshops in the woods. Exchange visits to camps and trainings, often with funding provided by GLW, continued until 2010. The links between AUG and GLW mean friends, joy and happiness, growth and development.

We all wish that we could live together in an environment of respect, peace and understanding. Sadly, this is not the case, but whatever happens in the east of Europe we know that there are many members of our guiding family working together, raising funds, giving service and doing their best to help others.

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### My first experience of the **Trefoil National Gathering**

If you ever get the chance to be part of a task and finish group, take it says Sheila Leete, National Programme and Development Adviser

Back in the autumn of 2018. I was approached to be a part of a task and finish group for the Trefoil National Gathering. It had never occurred to me that I might be considered to be part of a working group. That this working group was to plan and set up the Trefoil National

Gathering, was even more of a surprise. I'd never attended a National Gathering, and had no idea of what was involved. I decided that this was a challenge that I might enjoy!

The National Gathering is an activity holiday for Trefoil members, held every four vears. A chance to meet old friends and make new friends.

Planning meetings led by Ann Hall, the then Trefoil National Programme and Development Adviser, were held at Girlguiding Headquarters in London. I had met Ann only once before, when I was interviewed for a place on a TOPAZ project. Our initial team meeting was spent talking

As we drew closer to the weekend, all participants had submitted activity choices, and it was with satisfaction we realised that all preparations were in place – we were as prepared as we could be. The National Gathering is held over



a weekend, with participants arriving at 4pm on a Friday, full day activities on offer through Saturday and Sunday, returning home after breakfast on the Monday.

As the weekend arrived, an important part of the task and finish group's role was about to begin! Donning our colourful neckers for identification, we were there to meet and greet, direct people to their rooms, answer queries, helping or leading activities; generally making sure that everyone knew where they should be and when, helping with the smooth running to ensure that we all enjoyed our time together.

Activities were as varied as photography workshops, yoga or tai chi, murder mystery, learning how to play steel drums or handbells; crafts included lace making and pyrography. There was also a choice of day trips if members wished. These included a visit to the National Arboretum. Crich Tramway Museum or Hardwick Hall. Evening activities were organised for the

three evenings, culminating in a very lively barn dance!

As a part of the task and finish team, this for me was a working weekend and I enjoyed every minute of my experience, making many new friends.

### **Coronation reminiscences**

As we celebrate The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, **Shirley Featherstone** of Rickmansworth Trefoil Guild reveals her memories of the occasion and those of her fellow guild members, Edna, Sheila and Barbara

I was a Land Ranger in Croxley Green by 1953. As there were only a few of us, we celebrated the day by

watching the Coronation on new black and white televisions in friends' homes or in shop windows. Sheila remembers going to see her grandfather in a care home in Edinburgh to watch the Coronation on the television there.

In the evening everyone converged on the grounds of 'The Bury', now a nature

reserve surrounding a lake, to enjoy a bonfire and fireworks.

1st Croxlev Green Guides ioined a procession at the Dickinson Guildhouse and paraded to the village green, led by a band, while villagers lined the streets. On arrival, a fanfare announced the crowning of the 'queen' (a schoolgirl). The Guides, girls dressed in coloured skirts, white blouses and black waistcoats, and 'boys' dressed in green tunics and breeches. danced into the arena to the tune of Come Lasses and Lads. The maypole was danced and ribbons woven into several

patterns and duly unwoven. The Guides

then danced from the arena to the tune of D' ye ken John Peel. This was followed with a demonstration by the Sea

Rangers, SRS British Pride, Other organisations included the Scouts and Girls' Brigade. The mummers gave a performance of the folk play, and square dancing for all filled the rest of the day. When I was a Guide there I remember dancing the maypole on May Day. In West Hyde and Maple Cross, all the

> children - Brownies, Guides, Cubs, Scouts etc gathered in their recreation grounds in fancy dress, and prizes were awarded for the best. They paraded around the villages and back for races, games and displays by the youth clubs. Marquees had been

erected for refreshments.

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Members of The Girl Guides Association were eligible to wear the Coronation Badge (top) on their uniforms above the breast pocket of our battledress tops during the year. Our uniform at the time was silver-grey aertex blouses (summer) or ribbed knitted jumpers (winter) under navy battledress tops with matching skirts.






