Hello, I'm Nick McKerrow, I'm 37 years old. I'm from London where I've lived all my life. Like many people my age in London, I still live at home enjoying

family life but also my independence.

I work in a social enterprise cafe based in the Westminster City Council building in Victoria, where I'm training to be a barista. Hove working with customers on front-of-house best of all. We serve clients with hospitality in their meetings as well as breakfast, coffee and lunch in the cafe. The cafe is on the 19th floor of the building with panoramic views of London. I started taking dance seriously when I was studying GCSE Dance at secondary school. I went on to join several dance companies and then studied a Foundation

I was headhunted by Anjali Dance Company in 2007 and have been working with them ever since. Covid has made it impossible to continue to meet face to face, so we are still creating and rehearsing our work on Zoom two years later. Although we can't do live tours at the moment we have been able to do some filming.

I've enjoyed dressing up in dresses since I was young and I've built it up through the years, experimenting with my mum's clothes and the dressing-up box and make-up. I saw a Drag Syndrome

performance at Wandsworth Fringe in 2019 and just knew that I had to be part of it. I was given a break the very next day and was up on stage with them! From there my drag queen persona, Nikita Gold, has taken off into the stratosphere! I absolutely love it so much. I've met many famous drag queens and kings including Ru Paul and Michelle Visage, but it's too hard to say what the best experience has been. I've danced for the Pope on his visit to London, I've performed on West End stages, danced my way down the Gay Pride parade route and on stage in Soho afterwards.

I like working as a barista and would like to work in a top-class coffee shop with the rich and famous. I'd like to continue my contemporary dance career with a major dance company and develop my skills as an internationally acclaimed drag queen. On top of all of that, I'm looking forward to going on a walking holiday with my guild to the Scottish Highlands in October.

## Volunteers always welcome

### Trefoil Guild members turn into event gurus at Waddow Hall

After almost two years of virtual events, 2022 should hopefully see the return of in-person events for Girlguiding. We have many events to look forward to and, just like unit meetings, our events couldn't go ahead without the help of volunteers.

Pauline McDonald, Chair of East Liverpool Trefoil Guild in Merseyside and Assistant Chair of Merseyside Trefoil Guild, and her husband Bill regularly volunteer at Waddow Hall. Pauline and Bill have lent a hand at a number of events such as county weekends, Generation Green events, Wellies and Wristbands, Sparkle and Ice, Magic and Mayhem and Fearless Fun, to name a few.

Pauline first went to Waddow Hall as a Brownie when she was eight years old and has never stopped enjoying all it has to offer, and watching it grow and improve; she has now been volunteering for 51 years. "Volunteering for me started when I was a young guider, when they held working days at the start and end of the camping season", says Pauline. "Bill, on the other hand, started volunteering about eight years ago."

During the past two years, when allowed to travel, Pauline and Bill have been driving the 78 miles from their home to

Waddow Hall to help prepare the site for camping season. "As things improved, the pop-up cafe came to life, and it was wonderful to see locals enjoying the grounds and guiders returning to 'Our home in the country'," adds Pauline.

When Waddow Hall eventually reopened for indoor use, they helped get the cottages ready for the return of the girls and the house for leaders and Trefoil members, which involved serving food, washing dishes, making beds, cleaning and serving in the shop. "It was great fun." remembers Pauline.

There are many highlights of the pair's time volunteering at Waddow Hall, but the most important to them is "knowing that you have played a small part in making sure that girls have had a great experience and want to return. Knowing that everyone is in a safe environment, being out in fresh air even if it's cold, wet, frosty or snowing – yes, we have had all three in one day – you can still turn that around to a memorable experience!" smiles Pauline.

Their advice to anyone who may be thinking about volunteering at an event is to have an open mind and be ready to be amazed. "You will be made welcome:



you will not be on your own. Do not be afraid to ask if you do not know where somewhere is or what you are supposed to be doing. Remember, it does not matter if it's your first time or your one hundredth – spend time socialising with the older and younger volunteers, as you do get some really good ideas for your unit meetings."

Pauline and Bill volunteer for 'the love of Waddow' – they are made welcome by the staff and leave feeling appreciated by all who work at the activity centre – "Which is very important. The food is the same as those participating in the event and is always excellent.

Accommodation, whether in the house, self-catering or camping, is always excellent," according to Pauline.

On a personal note, Pauline told us, "I volunteer to pay back to Waddow just a little of what I have got from Waddow over the years — all the fun, friendships, and many happy memories."

We're always looking for volunteers to help at our events and centres, whether that's at Waddow Hall in Lancashire, Foxlease in the New Forest, Blackland Farm in Sussex or Glenbrook in the Peak District. With many volunteering options available, you're sure to find something to suit your needs.

## An away day in... Dorset

Enjoy the sights and history of Thomas Hardy's Wessex, travelling along the Jurassic Coast and meeting another Thomas Hardy!

To the west of **Lyme Regis**, start at the **Undercliff** – John Fowles, author of *The French Lieutenant's Woman*, owned a house, now part of a nature reserve, here – then on to **the Cobb**, the harbour wall, built in 1824. Look east to **Golden Cap**, the highest point on this coast.

Next on to **Bridport**, a town famous for rope making, with its market and lively music in **Bucky Doo Square**. In the summer, take the open-top **Jurassic Coaster** to Weymouth, one of the most scenic bus rides in the UK!

On to **West Bay**, a small port where part of *Far from the Madding Crowd* was filmed as was TV drama *Broadchurch*. Marvel at the notorious **East Cliff**, but don't go too near the edge – there have been recent landslides. Do see **Pier Terrace**, a Grade II-listed Arts and Crafts building designed by Edward Schroeder Prior in 1884/1885.

Continue east through Burton Bradstock, Swyre and West Bexington, then detour left at **Portesham** to the monument on the top of **Black Down**, erected in 1844 in memory of Vice-Admiral Sir Thomas Hardy, Lord Nelson's flag captain at Trafalgar. The views include Portland Harbour and the town of **Dorchester**, author Hardy's Casterbridge, as well as **Abbotsbury** 



Lyme Regis beach, harbour and the Cobb

Subtropical Gardens, 20 acres of exotic plants and watercourses. The gardens open on to the Fleet Lagoon bounded by Chesil Bank, home to a diversity of wildlife – fauna and flora – and to the swans of Abbotsbury Swannery.

A short climb from **Abbotsbury** village takes you to the ruined **St Catherine's Chapel**, built by the monks of the abbey. The views are incredible and seeing the sunset there is amazing. Be still, listen to the silence and wonder at how many feet have stood in this sacred place.

Wessex (Dorset), a county of culture, history and wonderful coast and countryside, expressed in Thomas Hardy's writings and in a painting by JMW Turner. Beauty is in the words of the writers or painting of the artist, but visitors to Dorset will forever hold dear in their hearts memories of this special place.

#### Pen friend letters to Japan

My nephew, Tom, has the same surname as my maiden name. He received a Facebook message from Felicity, a teacher of English in Japan, who had bought a bundle of letters at a flea market in Osaka. They came from a house-clearance sale and were letters written by a British girl to her pen friend in Osaka. The writer's surname was the same as Tom's and Felicity asked if there was a connection.

I contacted Felicity and she sent a photo of the letters to me (pictured top right). To my utter astonishment, I realised that they were the ones I had written to my Japanese pen friend, Keiko, who had lived in Osaka. The link had been set up by the Girlguiding pen friend service. I found it incredible that some of the letters I had written at the age of 14 to her had reappeared after 50-plus years.



In one I had written about my lovely Dad watching England play Portugal on the television in the World Cup semifinal – when I checked the



date, it would have been 26 July 1966!

In some of the letters, words have been underlined with Japanese writing above them, so I guess Keiko may have taken them into school to help with translation. We corresponded for a number of years until we were well into our late teens, but drifted away when we were at college and university.

In the days before mobile phones, internet, Facebook and all the other communications we have now, receiving a letter from abroad was always a great thrill. Even more so when a little inexpensive gift arrived from her, always packed with Japanese newspaper. Sadly, I have no letters of hers left, but I still have two Japanese dolls she sent me.

I still marvel that some of the letters I wrote all those years ago have been around the world twice and have come back home to me thanks to the wonder of modern communications. It is, as the song says, a small world.

Subject: Get Involved photo challenge Body of the email: Include your name and guild, and the name of each person in the photograph. Also include their guild if you know it, or if it is different to your guild. This is so we know who is in the image in case they change their mind about consent, and we need to stop using it. If you would like to tell us a little about the activity or event pictured you can do, but it is not essential.

**Photo formats accepted:** .png .jpg .JPG . JPEG .jpeg

Almost all photos taken on a phone, iPad, or digital camera will automatically be in these formats and you won't have to change anything. Photos over 1mb are

best. When you attach them to your email, if it gives you the option to change size, please send them as 'actual size' or 'large' so they retain their detail.

Only send in your very best images. You can take many to get the best shot, but you don't need to send them all. Have fun reviewing the images you have taken, and you can always work as a guild to choose a few favourite images to submit.

If you are having trouble emailing the photos, ask your local PR adviser or a friend for help — and if you know how to do it then why not offer to help others.

## How to write like a PR professional

Whether it's for a newsletter or a newspaper, here's how to get great publicity for Trefoil...

So you want to get stuck into the recruitment campaign and write something for a local group or publication, but you're not sure where to start? Don't fret – we're here to get you on the road to writing like a PR professional!

#### HERE ARE OUR TOP TIPS:

**1** Write a short but catchy headline to draw readers in.

2 Focus on the main thing you are trying to tell the reader and cut down the waffle around it. Your main message could be about how much Trefoil has to offer: fun, friendship, challenges, support, activities.

3 Include the Five Ws: WHO are we as an organisation, and WHAT Trefoil offers, WHERE and WHEN you meet, and WHY you think Trefoil is the organisation to join. It should be short but have impact, so choose punchy sentences for the main paragraph(s).

4 Don't be afraid to include a quote such as something someone has said to you at a meeting or written in an email.

5 Include a great photo that you have permission to share.

6 End with contact details that you're happy to have published. You can always direct potential members to the Trefoil website (trefoilguild.co.uk) where they can use their postcode to search for a guild local to them if you don't want to share personal contact information.

Why not shout about Trefoil in your residents' newsletter, on a community Facebook group, or in the quarterly update from another organisation? All publications have different word limits so write one article and adapt it to suit the space you have. For example, a post on a local Facebook group doesn't need a headline and is better being short. You can write about what your guild has to offer, how someone would benefit from joining, and include a time and place for meetings. A newspaper might allot you several paragraphs, allowing space to go into more detail about your programme or challenges, events or trips that a new member could get involved in.

### 70 years of The Trefoil

### Join us in celebrating the anniversary of Trefoil Guild's own magazine

Although Trefoil Guild started in 1943, it wasn't until nine years later that it got its own magazine. In 1952, a monochrome magazine called *Notes and News* began and was sold to members for 3d  $(1\frac{1}{4}p)$ . It was usually 16 pages long, though the last edition in Autumn 1955 was expanded to 24 pages of smaller print to report on the Trefoil Guild's fourth biennial Conference held at the

Haves Centre. Swanwick. After a 'hotly discussed' debate at the Conference, the **Executive Committee** voted to change the magazine name to The Trefoil and the first edition of 'The official Journal of The Trefoil Guild' appeared in Winter 1955. The journal subscription price was  $1/6d (7\frac{1}{2}p)$ . The national subscription to the Trefoil Guild was  $2/6d (12\frac{1}{2}p)$ .





#### What did the journal include?


Here are a few selections from articles.

- "A number of photographs have come in... please try to get better results and do avoid set groups of smiling members! We want 'action pictures' showing jobs you tackle, your 'service to the community'." (Some things never change! Editor)
- Proposals for the fifth National conference were published and guilds asked to discuss them. "That the Armlet does not serve any useful purpose, therefore is it necessary?" The armlet was a means of identifying members who weren't wearing a badge at events.
- "That the Swanwick Conference should be held every five years instead of biennially. It is appreciated that from the 'get together' angle the Conference is quite good but we do not feel that the Conference justifies such an expenditure."
- The cost for each delegate to the Conference was £4.10s (£4.50), which included the conference fee, full board and rail fare. This was 'pooled', which meant everyone paid the same amount, those living closer subsidising those living further away.




